

• The date for the state-wide Lions Food Drive is planned for Saturday, September 14, 2024

Each Lion Club will plan their <u>own</u> community Food Drive:


- Date: September 14th Choose time (8-2, 10 5, sunup to sundown, etc.)
- Location (grocery store parking lot, other well-known community site that many people will be able to reach)
- Pre-event Publicity/Public Support (local media, city/town government, other community leaders, Chambers of Commerce, churches and/or other civic groups, Scouts, school groups, Facebook and social media, flyers/posters in key locations at least 1 month prior and then again 1 week prior (invite reporters to come to the Food Drive for coverage
- Each Lions Club will determine to whom the donations will be given in their community (food banks, churches, other community groups)
 - Clubs will coordinate with them to know their needs for donations and that they will be open to take your collection.
 - The group being supported should have contacts to help you publicize the event and/or get donations.
- Determine collection and delivery plan (boxes to collect food donations, secure containers to collect cash donations, ways to load food (by container type – cans/boxes/bags or food type – pasta/bakery items/ vegetables/ meat or just by total number of items collected), signage at collection site, vehicles to deliver the donations.
 - Keep track of how much you collect in food and money.
 - Take plenty of pictures and videos to share with the ROAR and media.
- Post-event Publicity
 - Write an article for the local paper or get an interview with a local radio or TV station (tells your story of success)
 - MD 40 Communications Committee will put together a post event packet with information and pictures/videos from clubs to send to the Lions Magazine and instate media outlets.



PEACE POSTER BASIC RULES – Peace Without Limits

- The contest is open to students who will be 11, 12, or 13 years of age on November 15, 2024. Eligible bird dates are November 16, through November 15, 2013.
- Artwork must be no smaller than 13 inches by 20 inches and no larger than 20 inches by 24 inches. Do not mat or frame artwork.
- 3. Only one entry student and each entry must be the work of only one student.
- All artwork must be the individual student's original creation. Duplications are not accepted.
- All media are accepted. Note: Chalk, charcoal and pastel entries should be sealed with a fixative to prevent smearing. Do not laminate entries.
- Three-dimensional entries will not be accepted. Nothing may be glued, stapled or attached to the artwork in any way.
- The use of lettering or numbering on the front of the poster, in any language, is not allowed. All artist signatures or initials should be written on the back of the poster.
- Artwork should be done on a flexible material so it can be rolled for shipping in mailing tube. Do not fold poster
- LION DEADLINES: OCTOBER 1 Kit Purchase; November 15 Postmark deadline for a club to send one winning poster per contest sponsored to the District Governor; December 1 – Postmark deadline for DG to send one winning poster to the multiple district council chairperson; and December 15 – Postmark deadline for the MDCC to Brand & Creative at Lions International Headquarters.

The contest is open to students who are considered visually impaired according to their national guidelines, and will be 11, 12 or 13 years of age on November 15, 2024. Eligible birthdates are November 16, 2010 through November 15, 2013. One grand prize winner will receive an award and US\$5,000.

The contest theme is "Peace Without Limits."

- Only a Lions club can sponsor the contest. The contest may be sponsored in a local school or organized, sponsored youth group, or individuals may be sponsored as well.
- Essays must be no longer than 500 words, submitted in English, typewritten in black ink and double spaced.
- Each essay must be submitted with a completed entry form. Essays submitted without completed entry forms will be disqualified.
- · Only one entry per student per year, and each entry must be the work of only one student.
- · Essay entries cannot have already been published.
- Any essays found to be plagiarized will be disqualified, and the student will be prohibited from entering any future Lions competitions.

DEADLINES

November 15, 2024 – Postmark deadline for a club to send one winning essay to the district governor. Note: A participating club should notify its district governor in advance of sending an entry and confirm the date of the district judging at that time.

December 1, 2024 – Postmark deadline for a club not belonging to a district to send one winning entry directly to Brand & Creative at Lions Clubs International.

December 1, 2024 – Postmark deadline for a district to send one winning essay to the multiple district council chairperson. A district not belonging to a multiple district must send its entries directly to Brand & Creative at Lions Clubs International (postmarked by December 1).

December 15, 2024 – Postmark deadline for a multiple district to send one winning essay to Brand & Creative at Lions Clubs International.

February 1, 2025 - Club presidents of international winners will be notified on or before this date.


